Course Description

This course will introduce students to critical issues in the history of painting, sculpture, photography, and architecture from the mid-19th century to the late 20th century. Through an examination of specific art works and their historical context, we will examine the ways in which modern art is produced in an exchange between artists, ideas and institutions. We will discuss the history and cultural practices of artistic modernism with special focus on the work of the impressionists and Abstract Expressionists. We will also explore the significance of Feminist and the multicultural challenges to Modern traditions and the role of those challenges in redefinition of Western culture today.

Attending Policy
