Course Description

This course will expose students widely to the poetic writing. To foster students' writing potential, their own writing will be analyzed mutually first and finally each student will receive a revising advice from the instructor. During this process, the merits shown by their own writing and the challenge they actually met will be analyzed and then they could learn how to create their work lyrically. It also aims to help students to know how poetry is formed and how to view poetic works in an appreciating and critical way. Students will be required to read a lot of various poetic writing and texts.
