Course Description

This course provides an introduction to the world's largest faith traditions. Our goal is to gain, as far as is possible, a participant's appreciation of what is cherished by adherents of these traditions. Students will get familiar with and perception of the rituals, ceremonies, teachings, beliefs and worldview assumptions of adherents of the religions of India (Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism and Sikhism), religions of China (Confucianism, Taoism and Buddhism) and religions of the family of Abraham (Judaism, Christianity and Islam). The religious influences in the East and West, the interactions of various religions and the globalization of world religions will also be discussed.

Course Objectives

The goals of the course are to aid students in their future interaction with adherents of other faith traditions and to provide them with an accurate historical, creedal and experiential introduction to the worldview assumptions and religious experiences of adherents of various traditions. Students will also be encouraged to reflect on the centrality of religious faith for many worldwide and explore possible roles for religions in globalization and social progress.
